Support With Cost Of Living Crisis Over The Holiday Period We know that people across Surrey are feeling the impact of increasing costs and pressure on household budgets, and it's important that residents and businesses can access all the support they're eligible for.

The cold weather snap will also bring every day challenges for people wishing to stay connected to their communities and be safe and warm.

The council is working with lots of partners and charities to help people at this time. Things like the Surrey Crisis Fund, energy grants, Surrey's Warm Hub initiative, holiday clubs and library offers are all outlined, alongside useful tips and information to help reduce costs and stay safe and well.

Communities are being encouraged to look out for each other, particularly those people who may be more vulnerable than others.

Surrey's 2030 Plan Sets Out Support For People To Live Well In Later Life

Shaped from the views of hundreds of residents, carers, staff and care providers, Living Well in Later Life is the county council's plan for making Surrey the best place it can be for older people. The plan sets out the way the council, working with its partners in the NHS,

care sector and districts and boroughs, will support people to live and age well in Surrey over the next decade

The plan is centred around three priorities: prevention, living independently and care homes. Jonathan Fisher, Chair of the Surrey Coalition of Disabled People, was among partners who worked with the council and partners to devise the plan. Jonathan presents a video explaining what it's all about and how to get involved.

The council's keen to continue to gather residents' and partners' input as it works towards meeting the commitments in the plan. There will be opportunities to take part in workshops and surveys.

Success for Surrey's Integrated Carers Team

Earlier this year, the Integrated Carers Team were announced as finalists for the System-Led Support for Carers Award at the annual Health Service Journal (HSJ) Awards. Colleagues from the team, which comprises staff across both Surrey County Council and Surrey Heartlands, recently attended the HSJ Awards in London where winners and highly commended projects were chosen by an expert panel of judges.

The Integrated Carers Team beat three other short-listed finalists to achieve Highly Commended in the System-Led Support for Carers category. The award recognises integrated care systems working to deliver the NHS Long Term Plan ambitions to support unpaid carers. The team's submission was titled "no carer should care alone".

CQC Who I am Matters Report Published

On the 3 November CQC published a <u>report entitled 'Who I am</u> <u>Matters'</u> on the experiences of being in hospital for people with a learning disability and autistic people. The report is a stark reminder that people with a learning disability and autistic people are still not getting the care they need, when they need and shines a light on the impact these failings have on people and their families.

During February and March 2022, CQC visited eight hospitals in England which found that although there were pockets of good practice, people with a learning disability and autistic people are still not being given the quality of care and treatment they have a right to expect when they go to hospital.

The report features: access to care, communication, care and treatment in hospital, protected characteristics and equality of care and workforce skills and development. For further information or to review the full report, please visit <u>CQC</u>.

UK-wide Veterans' Survey Launched

Hearing from the veteran community is vital and that is why the government has launched a UK-wide Veterans' Survey. This is the first-ever exercise to collect feedback from the veterans' community across the UK coordinated by the Office for Veterans' Affairs and the Office for National Statistics (ONS).

The online survey was launched on 10 November and will close on the 21 January. The survey gives ex-UK armed forces personnel and their families the opportunity to provide direct feedback to the government on their experiences, access to and use of services for veterans.

Responses to the survey will help them to better understand the experiences, needs and well-being of the veteran community, and guide future action. It is important they hear a wide range of views and they would like to encourage as many ex-UK armed forces veterans and their families to share feedback as possible.

This particularly applies to several local authority and health core services, including: education, health, housing and homelessness.

Surrey County Council's Armed Forces Team deliver training to raise awareness of the act among colleagues, this includes everyone working within the above areas and beyond. The training ensures that you understand what you need to do in order to fulfil this new legal obligation and provides an opportunity to understand more about the armed forces community and how they can be supported.

New Surrey Context JSNA Chapter Released

The useful menus and filters allow you to toggle between various health geographies where the data is able to be mapped (including PCN and Place-based partnerships), as well as administrative geographies (including districts and boroughs). Young Adult Safe Haven pilot extended

The Young Adult Safe Haven is a service provided by Catalyst and Oakleaf that supports 18-25 year olds with their mental health and wellbeing. It is open from 5pm – 9pm, 7 days a week, 365 days a year and is located next door to the current adult Safe Haven in Guildford at Oakleaf's premises. The service has now been extended for an additional six months.

The Young Adult Safe Haven offers a safe place for young adults (18-25 year olds) to talk openly and confidentially about their feelings and emotions with peers and young adult support workers. The Young Adult Safe Haven operates as a drop-in service and no appointment is needed.

Trading Standards: Beware of Rogue Traders

The Chartered Trading Standards Institute (CTSI) has issued a warning following a rise in complaints about doorstep callers telling homeowners they may be eligible for free insulation under the Government funding scheme. The rogues then use pressure selling techniques and persuasive jargon about the energy crisis to make the householders agree to remedy works being completed and to pay upfront, with reassurances they can claim the costs back from the Government.

One such example of these high-pressure selling techniques is offering a 'free health check' of the householder's roof, which results in false claims about poor insulation and issues with damp and mould, sometimes spray foam is then offered as a solution to resolve the issues, even if this is not necessary. If in correct materials are used this can affect you selling the property later on.

Gatwick Foundation Fund Relaunches

The Gatwick Foundation Fund has relaunched after being suspended during the pandemic. Grants are available for local projects that

support young people, improve health and wellbeing, tackle social isolation and disadvantage, or raise aspirations and employment opportunities.

People working for local community projects in Tandridge, Reigate and Banstead and Mole Valley can now apply for funding from Gatwick Airport's Foundation Fund, with projects receiving £100,000 in total across three rounds of funding.

The Fund is designed to distribute the economic benefits that the airport generates among local people and communities that may not benefit directly from other economic contributions the airport brings to the region.

Gatwick's Foundation Fund was originally launched in late 2016 and – to date – a total of £1.2 million has been distributed in 236 grants, benefiting over 100,000 people across Sussex, Surrey and Kent.
